


Boating in Washington provides great access to our rivers, lakes and Puget Sound.

Every time you get underway you can make smart choices that will minimize your impact.

Clean Marinas are doing their part to protect water and wildlife by providing shoreside disposal of hazardous materials and encouraging boaters to always use Best Management Practices (BMPs).

# **Best Management Practices (BMPs)**

### **Fueling**

- Do not overfill or top off your fuel tank.
- Use oil absorbents or other devices to catch drips.

## Maintenance and Repair

- Keep your boat mechanically sound.
- Never drain engine fluids into the bilge.
- Always haul out at a boatyard for repairs over 25% of the topside area.
- For all projects, capture and contain dust, drips and debris when working over the water.

### **Boat Washing**

- Rinse and scrub your boat often with fresh water.
- Use small amounts of phosphate-free and biodegradable soaps to spot clean.

### Sewage

- Do not discharge sewage in the marina basin.
- Untreated discharges are prohibited in state waters.
- Pump, don't dump!

### Bilge Care

- Use oil absorbents to clean oily bilges.
- Do not pump contaminated bilge water overboard; use approved shore-side facilities.

### **Hull Cleaning**

- In-water cleaning of boat hulls that have ablative or soft antifouling paints is prohibited.
- Use pressure-wash haulout facilities that collect & treat wastewater.

### Hazardous Materials

- Safely dispose of used oil and filters, batteries, unused paint, solvents, antifreeze and other chemicals at your county hazardous waste collection site.
- Buy only what you need, select less-toxic products, recycle!
